



# DEAR FPC FAMILY,

It's hard to believe another year has come and gone. We might feel the busyness of this holiday season more intensely after a quieter Christmas last year. As such, we invite you to join us in setting aside time to pause and prayerfully reflect on the significance of Advent. We pray that once a week, you would practice the lighting of candles, the reading of Scripture, the praying of liturgies, and meditating on classic hymns to be grounded in Christ in this season.

You might use this as a personal reflection guide, making sure to read the Scriptures and the prayers aloud. Perhaps you want to set a weekly Zoom date with friends or family to pray and discuss the questions together. If you live with others, you might gather round the table once a week to light the candles and enjoy the liturgy together.

If this sounds meaningful to you, please go ahead and prepare five candles. While any candles will suffice, three purple candles, one rose candle, and one white candle will embody the rich symbolism of this season. The purple is the color of royalty, and points us toward welcoming the King of Kings. Pink represents joy and celebration as we remember the birth of Jesus and anticipate His coming again. White represents the purity, light, and sinlessness of our Savior. The white candle, often referred to as the Christ candle, is positioned in the center of the evergreen wreath, which symbolizes the everlasting love of God.

Interestingly, Advent used to be a season of repentance and fasting. Much like Lent, Advent was a time of spiritual reflection. With the birth of Jesus inextricably linked to His crucifixion, both seasons were a time of spiritual preparation to receive our King. The shift toward celebration happened on the third Sunday in Advent, hence the pink candle of joy being lit on that day. While times certainly have changed, how might God be inviting you into a season of joyful expectancy and spiritual preparation as we journey toward Christmas this year?

We will be sending a Christmas gift to each of your homes in the coming days. We're excited about the new life and encouragement this gift can bring to you and your loved ones. Whether you are going on the road or staying at home this Christmas, you'll want to have this gift in time!

We pray that practicing these rhythms would bring the hope, peace, joy, and love of Christ our Savior into your homes this season.
