"Because of poultry training, my chickens grew and we were able to eat and sell them. We planted vegetables like cilantro, radishes, and lettuce, which I sold, and with that I was able to support myself. Because of the work that I have done with Plant With Purpose, I have become a better person and my eyes have been opened. It's like I woke up and learned to defend myself. I live happily and I am calmer. I talk with my family and they tell me there are setbacks in life, but I can choose to move forward. Ultimately, it is God who comes first, and thanks to Him, I have this community. We all do our part; what little we can give, we give to each other."

ABOUT OAXACA, MX

Plant With Purpose works in three of the most impoverished states in Mexico including Chiapas, Oaxaca, and Puebla. In Mexico, almost 42% of the population lives below Mexico's national poverty (UNDP 2021). For the primarily indigenous groups with whom we work. families depend smallholder agriculture to meet nutritional and economic needs. Of indigenous peoples in Mexico, over 80% are considered to be extremely (UN 2015). Indigenous communities often are marginalized, making them more vulnerable to environmental degradation, further exacerbating their cycle of poverty.
