# Look Back (10 minutes)

- What might it mean for you to love your fellow follower of Jesus even as Jesus has loved us?
- Why do you think a non-believer would know that we follow Jesus by witnessing our love for one another?
- What comfort can we derive from the fact that in the same episode Jesus commands Peter to love even as He predicts Peter's denial of Him?

# Reaching Upwards: Growing in Your Relationship with God

- Meditate on Jesus' ultimate act of love on the cross, and ask the Holy Spirit to help you love others by convincing you of the reality of His sacrifice.
- Jesus tells us being His witness is a matter of loving others; ask the Holy Spirit to show you any ways in which you are instead settling for doing or saying the "right" things.

# Reaching Outward: Investing in Your Neighbors

- Sometimes loving another means an uncomfortable or difficult task geared toward their ultimate good. If you know you need to do such a task, ask God for the courage and strength to accomplish it.
- Your unbelieving friends are to witness Jesus by observing His followers love each other. To do that, it helps for unbelievers to be where His followers are. Consider inviting an unbelieving friend to a church service or event. - Peter swore he would love Jesus to the utmost, but then denied Him. If you have failed to love others as Jesus commands, confess that to Him, and take comfort in Jesus' loving forgiveness of Peter.
