"I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. **19** For the creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed. **20** For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope **21** that the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God."

- Romans 8:18-21

- 4. What promise does Paul give in this passage? Why is it relevant to us?
- 5. Why would Paul say that our present sufferings are *not worth comparing* with our future glory? What do you think he is trying to convey?
- 6. Does Paul seem to think that suffering and pain will last forever, or that it will end some day? Do you agree?
- 7. Do you think that hope in a future life with God can affect your life in the present? Why or why not?
- 8. How would your life look different if you lived with this promise in mind?
