- 1. How does Jesus describe himself to the church in Smyrna?
- 2. What was the city of Smyrna like? How easy was it to be a Christian there?
- 3. How are the impoverished Christians in Smyrna rich?
- 4. What is the victor's crown? How is it granted according to the end of verse 10?

ENVISION HOW THE TEXT—WHEN APPLIED—MIGHT TRANSFORM YOUR INNER LIFE IN TERMS OF YOUR THOUGHTS, ATTITUDES, AND BEHAVIORS

- 1. In Smyrna, Christians were persecuted and impoverished for not following along with cultural norms. Are you willing to give up worldly wealth to identify with your faith and the riches God provides?
- 2. What assurances can you rely upon when your faith is tested? Is it easier to gain strength knowing that the Christians in Smyrna remained committed to Christ?
- 3. How does knowing that nothing can hurt you in eternity make you think about your trials today? What can you do to live victoriously today?

Reaching Upwards: Growing in Your Relationship with God

- Memorize 1 Peter 1:6-7 and pray that you rejoice in trials. If you are going through something currently, consider asking someone to pray through this verse with you.
- Prayerfully consider what your life looks like when you have complete trust in the riches of eternal life.

Reaching Outward: Investing in Your Neighbors

- Seek out another believer this week and offer them an encouraging scripture verse.
- Think of someone in your midst who is struggling right now and buy them a meal, send them a card, or send them a gift to remind them of God's love
