

# Called to a New Purpose

### This new mission statement is a three-part

reflection of who we believe God is leading us to be now and in the future.

Building on the legacy of the past, it resonates with our foundation of being rooted in God's Word, motivated by the example of Jesus, and faithful to serve for the good of the Gospel wherever we are. Leaning into the future, it embraces values that are central to our future: the importance of community to developing faith, both in ourselves and those we are called to reach, and the mandate to meet the needs of those within our reach.

When coupled with the supporting values, rhythms, and characteristics of our community, our prayer is that by 2040, we see a vibrant congregation of all ages and backgrounds, deeply formed in the way of Jesus Christ, who have been equipped and empowered to lead in their networks and neighborhoods.

Central to this vision is raising up, reproducing, and releasing leaders in order to reach the city. By helping our Covenant Partners discover their spiritual gifts, then fanning the flame of who God created them to be and how God created them to lead, we aim to renew the church.

Our desire to renovate the church is not a simple or self-serving desire to perpetuate our own institution, but rather to return the church to all that it was ordained to be, leading the nations in the way of Jesus, empowered by the Spirit, to the glory of God.

## BY 2025 WE WILL...

#### Initiate 5000 Intentional Invitations to Cultivate Community

We aim to celebrate 5000 intentional invitations that cultivate community. These invitations may be as simple as summoning a fellow Covenant Partner to take their next strategic step (from Gather into Equip or Equip into Serve) or as relationally risky as beckoning someone close to us but far from God into a spiritual conversation at Alpha. All year long and throughout every facet of our church, we will pray for and celebrate stories of practicing gospel-centered hospitality in a culture of hostility.



### BY 2027 WE WILL...

#### **Clear a Discipleship Pathway**

We will pave a clear discipleship pathway from the brush of overly programmatic ministry activity.

#### **Build a Leadership Pipeline**

We will construct a fully formed leadership pipeline to recruit, train, and deploy Covenant Partners into Kingdom ministry.

#### **Reform Missional Integration**

We will integrate and align our Missional Rhythms—Gather, Equip, Serve—into every facet of our congregation from welcoming first-time guests to longtime Covenant Partners.

#### Reengage Our Neighborhood

We will reengage our immediate neighborhood with the good news of the way of Jesus.

### **SERMON SERIES**

This series begins our ministry year, in which we will explore our mission, values, strategy, measures, and the vision for FPC's future.

Sermon Title: Cultivating Community Scripture: Genesis 1:26-2:4, Acts 2:42-47 Preacher: Rev. Curtis A. Bronzan

#### Introduction

Divergent from other ancient creation accounts, Genesis 1 depicts a God who creates out of love. Other explanations of the origins of the world include warring cosmic deities or gods who create humanity so they don't have to work. The Hebrew Scriptures, conversely, describe a God who enjoys work and calls his people to do the same.

### Introduction

After exploring the idea of cultivating community the week prior, this message introduces our one-year goal: 5000 invitations to others to the good news of Jesus.

Sermon Title: In The Way of Jesus Scripture: Luke 6:12–19 Preacher: Rev. Dr. Courtney McLaughlin

#### Introduction

We are not only called to believe in Jesus, but to follow Jesus. As such, our mission statement includes the phrase "in the way of Jesus." We are not "cultivating community" for its own sake, but rather, in the way of Jesus—which can be taken two ways: First, as a description of *how* we cultivate, and second, *what* we hope our community embodies.

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Sermon Title: For the Flourishing of the City Scripture: Jeremiah 29:1-9 Preacher: Rev. Curtis A. Bronzan

#### Introduction

Jeremiah 29 is a kind of tale of two cities, as described by Charles Dickens. Instead of London and Paris, however, the two cities "the weeping prophet" has in mind are Jerusalem and Babylon. In this chapter of salvation history, God's people have been carried into captivity by Nebuchadnezzar.






Sermon Title: Equipped to Build Up Scripture: Ephesians 4:1-16 Preacher: Rev. Curtis A. Bronzan

#### Introduction

Paul's letters are often written in two halves. The first half explores what God has done for us through Jesus, and the second half reveals what we are to do in response. The Message relays this shift well: "In light of all this, here's what I want you to do." Or, more thoroughly, "Now the apostle moves from the new society to the new standards which are expected of it. So, he turns from exposition to exhortation, from what God has done (in the indicative) to what we must be and do (in the imperative), from doctrine to duty, from the credenda... to the agenda, from mind stretching theology to its down-to-earth, concrete implications in everyday living."

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
