Anticipatory Grief and Joy

"In the desert, the whole community grumbled" — Do you ever feel like you are a part of a whole community grumbling? Or maybe you are the one that people are grumbling against? Either way, dissatisfaction in life is real; and further, many of us hold expectations of being able to fix our "problems." In American culture, we can plan, execute, solve, and sway our challenges and difficulties into submission—or so we think. But, what we can learn in this Exodus story is that there is a deeper truth here about trust. The Isrealites (like us) need to relinquish their control and trust God to provide for them. The Isrealites (like us) need to stop and rest in God and His promises and provision for us.

EQUIP

Take some time to pause and then consider the questions together as a group.

- As you prepare for Holy Week and Easter, what is something you find yourself most anticipating? And is there something you tend to avoid or put off during this time?
- What do you imagine the disciples were anticipating as this moment unfolded before them?
- How might the disciples have wrestled with confusion—hearing Christ boldly declare Himself the righteous Davidic Messiah, while also recalling His earlier acknowledgment that He would soon suffer and die?
- The disciples may have been filled with uncertainty, but Jesus moved forward with unwavering clarity—driven by love. Have you ever witnessed this kind of love—the kind that presses on even when something painful lies ahead (a diagnosis, a divorce, a death)?
- How can we be present with someone walking through anticipatory grief—when the sorrow has already begun, even though the loss is still to come?
- In this Holy Week, as we look toward the cross and also the empty tomb, what are some practical ways we can draw near to Jesus—being present with Him in both His suffering and His promised resurrection?
